But shit, man, it's awfully damn selfish, don't you think; I mean for a rational man, don't you think maybe it's a little bit one-sided? O.k., O.k., I know how you feel, already, I understand. Now you shut up and listen to me, because there's a few things I want to say to you, and anybody else who might be interested. First off, I want to say that there's lots more than a score of us who feel that what you've been able to do with and for the Free U. is an accomplishment of no small dimensions. Obviously, what the Free U. is today is the result of many people's contributions. But it's equally clear that the development of this living organism from a year ago to now would've been a completely different story without you. And man, you oughta know that story, because a lot of it's been written with your sweat and tears, but it's easy to forget, so here's to remind you. Chapter I -- Vic Lovell, elected Coordinator on a platform whose major plank was the open curriculum. And forever ended was the conflict over that issue, and the Free U. assumed a character that stands today as a statement about who we all are, and what we're trying to do. And then, yes, Virginia, we will take political stands, because "education which has no consequences for social action...is empty." Some still disagree, but there we are, and you know, really, one of the main things is this -- the kind of leader you are is that you hold absolutely to what you believe in. No Hubert Humphrey potential in you, man, no sir. You always put it all out, because you believe in your ideas. Yeah, all right, we've changed them already where they weren't working. But, you know, we might've just gone off in a hundred different directions, without your particular vision. I really think that, because it is all part of one thing in your head, and because you're so fucking good at putting it into words and sharing it with us all, well -- you've given us a lot of badly needed stability and continuity. A few other things that stand out in my mind -- you went to jail in October -- we were so proud of all you guys -- like little kids, wow! You presented the Anti-Draft and Anti-Marijuana Laws resolutions, and spelled out the Committee System, and sold us on them. You got us joined with The Experiment last summer, and have continued to keep us active at Stanford. Confrontations -again, a new idea, trying to meet the new needs of a new kind of organization. And all your classes, some of the best we've got -the Tao weekend, Sexual Morality Now, and all those people you show what it is to be open, to share your feelings, to use your head. It's hard to pin it down in specifics, you know, because it's a lot more than that. It's that you always have the strength to fight it out. You never want people to accept your ideas unchallenged, and they certainly never do. You've lost some, as I said -paying teachers, raising the fee, the Score sccretaries finally. And you bend over backwards to help other people implement their ideas, and to set it up so that everyone can work within a solid structure, but still a free and flexible one. No mean accomplishment, as I said.

So, well, you won't be our coordinator any more, and it won't be the same, and I expect you don't want it to be the same, hopefully, ever. You've given us a lot of energy and a lot of good directions and a dose of really fine leadership, and it's a damn good thing you'll still be working with us. Yeah, yeah, o.k., I'm being one-sided too, maybe, mawkish, even! But just the same, thanks. We love you. Peace and Freedom,
